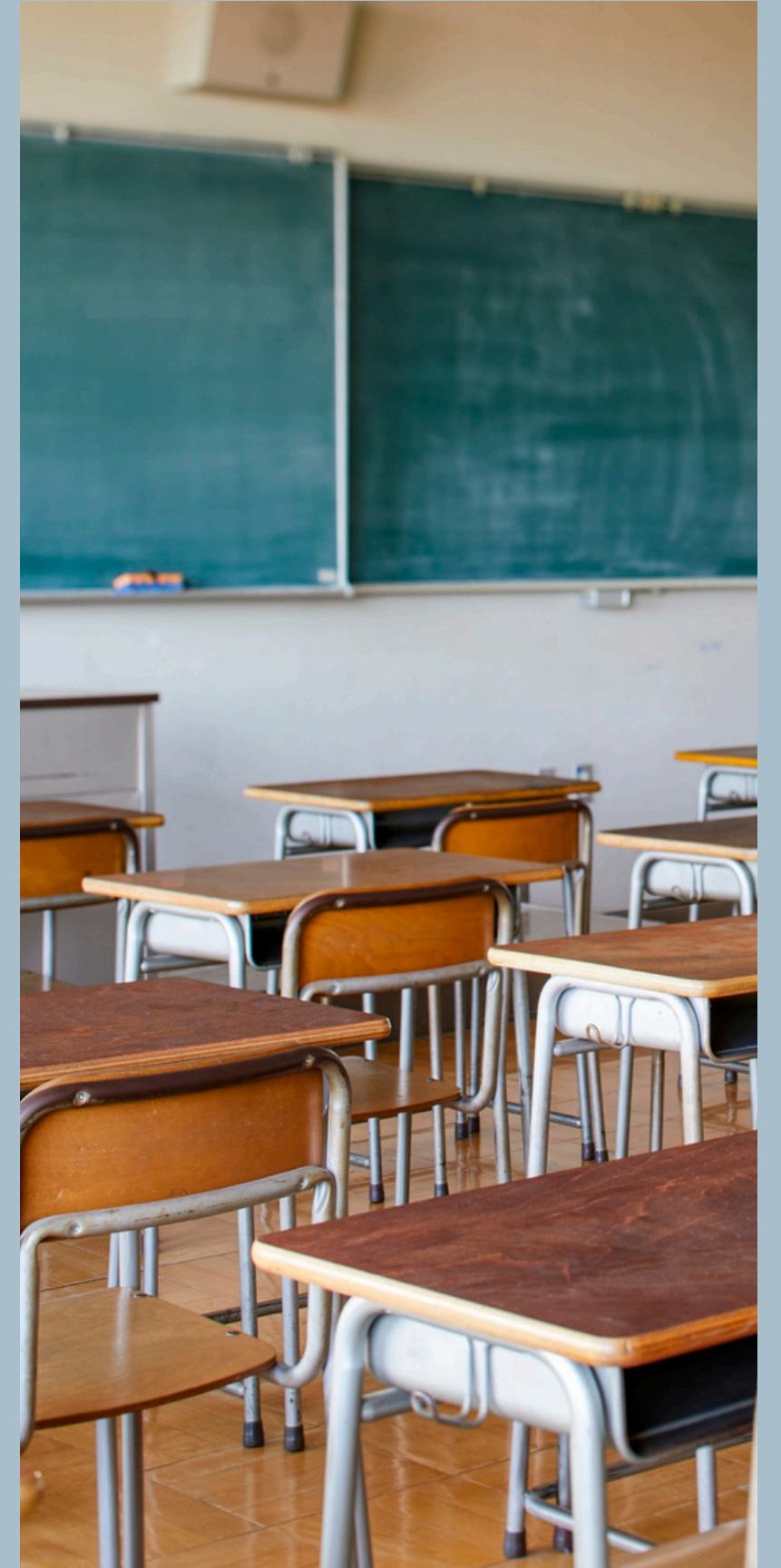

Brief History of Segregation

1896 **Plessy V. Ferguson** establishes precedent for “Seperate but equal”

1900-1954 Systematic **underfunding** and **overcrowding** of black schools leading to inequality

1971 Swann v. Charlotte-Mecklenburg Board of Education upheld the use of **busing** as a tool to **achieve racial integration**. **Accelerating** desegregation efforts in urban districts by transporting students across neighborhood lines.

1970's-1980's White Flight and Political Backlash - Busing faced ruthless opposition, especially in cities like Boston. **Many white families moved to the suburbs** or enrolled children in private schools **in a deliberate attempt to undermine integration efforts**.

Why has it taken so long?

Reasons for the slow pace of integration:

- Many Southern states actively fought integration, with some closing public schools to avoid desegregating them.
- There was a lack of federal enforcement, and some presidential administrations were not strong supporters of the desegregation effort.
- School officials and local communities found ways to delay or obstruct integration, sometimes facing violent protests and social unrest.
